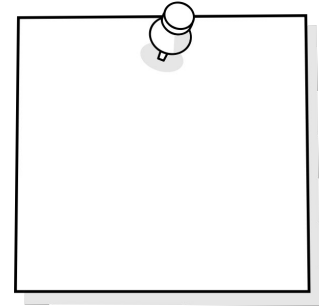
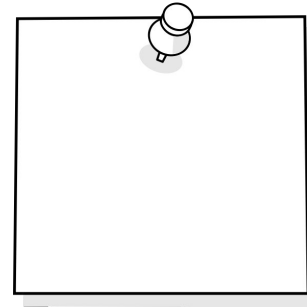
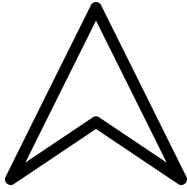

Why are stories important?

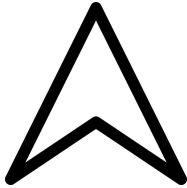
- Make an emotional connection
- Maintain the reader's interest
- Help the reader connect to the lives of real people
- Help the reader comprehend the proposed solution
- Help the reader to understand the problem

Share your ideas with the group and then write out a 1-2 paragraph story in your student folder.

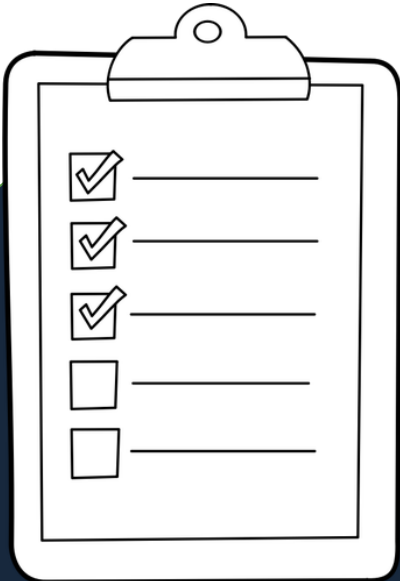


Story Feedback

- Is story relatable (to a grant narrative, & emotionally to reader)?
- Does the story align with the problem and solution?
- Is the story the right length?
- Is the story clear/ easy to understand?

Options for Giving Feedback

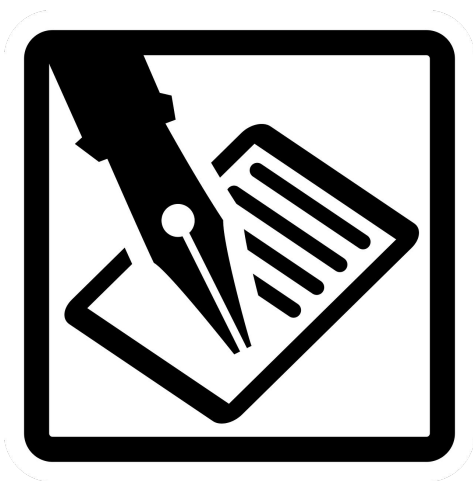
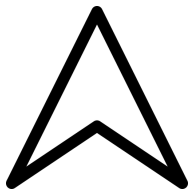
- Provide +’s first, then areas for improvement ... or
