




# **Storytelling Brainstorm**

Tell us what stories resonate with you and why you feel storytelling is so important to your work.










### Why are stories important?

- Make an emotional connection
- Maintain the reader's interest
- Help the reader connect to the lives of real people
- Help the reader comprehend the proposed solution
- Help the reader to understand the problem

### **Story Feedback**

- Is story relatable (to a grant narrative, & emotionally to reader)?
- Does the story align with the problem and solution?
- Is the story the right length?
- Is the story clear/ easy to understand?

- Use framework: I like..., I wish..., what if...
