What Questions Do You Ask Before Drafting a Statement of Need?

- How much context should I provide for reader to really understand the problem?
 - Who is my audience?
 - Why **now**?! Linkage to time-hook
 - How does this relate to current events?
 - Who am I talking to? How are they related to the issue?
 - How much information do they already know (are you writing to subject matter experts (SME)?
- What solutions can I bring to my problem (which you are going to write about later in proposal)
- Does the information you provide in the statement of need align with your solution?
- What is opportunity cost of not addressing the problem?
 - Is this information that the reader should be aware of? Will it inform their evaluation of your proposal?

What data should I include?

- Story? Data? Quote from expert?
- Depends on your audience... also depends on the project you are proposing






Questions to Help You Determine Key Data/Evidence



- Describe the community.
 - Who is affected?
- Is the problem systemic in nature with a long history?
 - Are there studies and reports?
- Is this a new problem?
 - Is it getting worse and is there evidence?
- Does the problem affect individuals' quality of life?
 - Why should we care and is there evidence?
- Does the problem harm individuals and the community?
 - Describe the distinctions between the two.
