


L7A2- Examples of Logic Models

1 Example 1



3 Example 3

In example 3, there is a component we did not cover in the lesson - assumptions. Assumptions are the beliefs you have based on research, evaluations, and your lived experiences that indicate how the elements you added in the Logic Model will contribute to solving the problem raised in the problem statement. Although we do not include assumptions in our exercises, some funders will require assumptions in their Logic Models so it is important to familiarize yourself with them.
